Eze is one of the most picturesque and impressive villages on the Côte d'Azur. This beautiful village dates back to the middle ages and clings impressively to the mountainside above the Mediterranean Sea, between St Jean Cap Ferrat and Monaco. Panoramic views, ancient façades, and an unbelievable attention to detail are some of the most memorable features of this lovely village. Today, you cruise. But first, head for the hills, visiting Eze-sur-Mer, a medieval town perched atop a rocky peak. The ocean views from its upper reaches are a calming pleasure although they are even better with haute cuisine from the dining room of the two Michelin Star La Chèvre d'Or.

Behind its air of a seaside resort, Cannes is a city of business and leisure, relaxation and festivals, a city with many faces. Sheltered by the Massif de l'Esterel and facing the sea, the city enjoys a Mediterranean climate with hot and dry summers and mild yet slightly damp winters. The sun shines here 300 days out of the year. In the morning, continue to Cannes, leaving your yacht to climb the hill of Mont Chevalier and visit the oldest part of the town. Stroll down La Croisette for luxury shopping, dine in the old town or enjoy a night anchored in the bay, watching the timeless city.



Pouting sexpot Brigitte Bardot came to St-Tropez in the 1950s to star in Et Dieu Créa la Femme (And God Created Woman; 1956) and overnight transformed this peaceful fishing village into a sizzling jet set favourite. Tropeziens have thrived on their sexy image ever since. Leave early and stop along the way, anchoring among the Îles d'Hyères to spend the morning on the silver crescent of Notre Dame Beach. Sailing into St. Tropez, anchor for a swim on famed Pampelonne beach, an extraordinarily long stretch of sand said to be the home of the bikini, well worn here by Brigitte Bardot. Dine ashore and shop the market every Tuesday and Saturday at the Place des Lices.



With a prize-winning market, seafood specialities and underwater explorations, Sanary is a lesiurely coastal spot on the French Riviera near Toulon. Sanary-sur-Mer has always been a popular destination for boat lovers and beach-goers in 2018 its market was voted the most beautiful in France. Continue west the next day to the pretty fishing town of Sanary sur-Mer, with a promenade along the palm trees and a find a selection of little beaches, the pick of which is Portissol. The surrounding woodlands, olive groves and fields also offer a romantic stroll. And enjoy an equally romantic meal on board your yacht, perhaps in a special location on the sun deck enjoying the beautiful views.


The Camargue is a place where man lives alongside horses, bulls, birds, sky and water. It is a fragile sanctuary for fauna and flora, uncommon in Europe, protected by the Camargue regional park and natural reserve, forming a unique landscape. Moreover, the Roman and Romanesque Monuments of Arles are classified by UNESCO as a World Heritage sites. For true peace there is little to rival the final stop. Sail past Marseilles to the delta of briny lagoons and sandbars that is Camargue. Explore by foot or bicycle and see the bountiful wildlife, including semi-wild Camargue horses and flamingos. Back aboard, fall asleep to the sound of crickets – and absolutely nothing else.



France's second city is enjoying a resurgence, attracting visitors away from Provence's more traditional tourist spots with its combination of arts, music, cuisine, architecture, shopping and exciting culture. This morning, say goodbye to the serenity of Camargue and sail back to Marseilles where you will disembark and meet your plane.
