



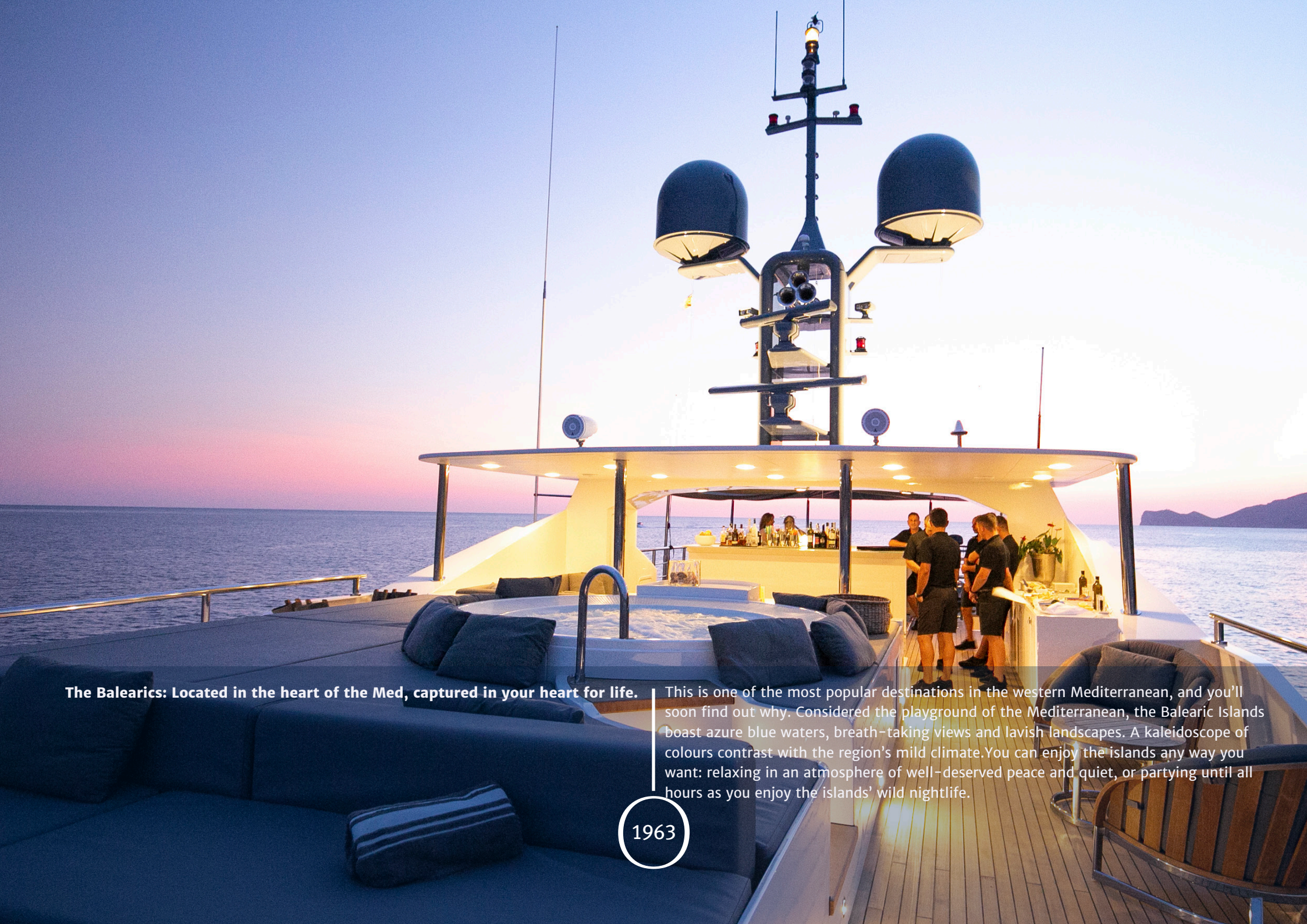

This is one of the most popular destinations in the western Mediterranean, and you'll soon find out why. Considered the playground of the Mediterranean, the Balearic Islands boast azure blue waters, breath-taking views and lavish landscapes. A kaleidoscope of colours contrast with the region's mild climate. You can enjoy the islands any way you want: relaxing in an atmosphere of well-deserved peace and quiet, or partying until all hours as you enjoy the islands' wild nightlife.

The isolation of the 19 islands and 12 small islands of the Cabrera Archipelago has shaped one of the most singular and best preserved coastal landscapes in the Mediterranean. Due to all this and to its exceptional seabed, in 1991 this area was declared Spain's first Maritime-Terrestrial National Park. Is part of the Migjorn Marine Reserve, Is the biggest protected marine area in the West Mediterranean Sea.

Embark in Palma the capital of the Balearics, despite having become a modern, vibrant city, Palma has managed to retain its old town and its ancient culture and charm. Palma offers interesting narrow streets, with many restored historic buildings that will impress you, quiet courtyards, and a lively harbour front with a nice selection of restaurants. After lunch, cruise across to the nature reserve island of Cabrera, to spend the night moored at the bay

DAY 1

PALMA - CABRERA

Dalt Vila, Ibiza's fortified old town:
Wonderful panoramic views, a treasure trove of history, mystery and discoveries, spanning 2,500 years, are all encapsulated in this UNESCO World Heritage site.

From the quiteness of Cabrera cruise west destination Ibiza, an island of delightful contrasts. Multicultural and cosmopolitan, but firmly grounded in it rural roots. Bustling and relaxing. World famous, but at the same time unknown. An Mediterranean exceptional corner, visited by many for it's vibrant nightlife but offereing many other attractions.



DAY 2

CABRERA - IBIZA

The coast of the Gulf of Porto is one of Corsica's most famous landscapes, and rightly so - with its dramatic sculpted red rock and sweeping bays it has to be seen to be believed.


Just a short trip from Ibiza port, you will arrive to the heavenly island of Formentera. In just a few square kilometers all ingredients to consider the island as a paradise are present. Its beaches of white sand, contrast with the turquoise waters, where the valuable Posidonia inhabits. You can explore the island in search of secret corners and beautiful places where to loose yourself.
An island although small will not leave you indiferent!!



DAY 3

1963

IBIZA TOWN - FORMENTERA




One of the most iconic images of Ibiza is out of it but only for a few metres. It's the rocky ensemble that knock into shape the little island of Es Vedrà. Suddenly, its silhouette appears in front of your eyes. Because of its special magnetism, it has been linked with paranormal phenomenal and sightings. That's what the Carmelite missionary Francisco Palau claimed, who in that time maintained that during his solitary retirement in Es Vedrà he had seen celestial beings and Ladies of Light. What possibly were mystical metaphors have encouraged the belief that the crags send out a special energy that, according to sailors, sometimes drives the control knobs needles crazy.

Cruise along the Southern coastline of the Island of Ibiza and anchor for lunch under the spectacular rock island of Es Vedrà. Dive around the impressive sheer rock formations, before cruising along the numerous coves on the west coast, on our way to the rugged beaches of Cala Salada. Surrounded by a barely urbanized green environment, Cala Salada is one of the most appreciated beaches in the island of Ibiza due to its crystal clear turquoise waters, its mediterranean landscape almost intact and its fine golden sand.

DAY 4

1963

FORMENTERA - ES VEDRÀ & CALA SALADA



Port d'Andratx is a magnetic place, luring visitors with beautiful surroundings, an intriguing combination of beach and mountain, and supported by a wide range of shops and gastronomic delights. The sunset in this stunning harbour in a summer evening is priceless and unrivalled. As the nightfall approaches gently, a more pleasant temperature and the street lighting bring about a nocturnal atmosphere powered by summer spirit.

After an early-morning cruise back across to the Island of Mallorca, water ski beneath the towering cliff of Cabo de la Mola. Enjoy an early-evening venture inland to the old Town of Andraitx, where the local Mallorquin charm runs throughout the cobbled streets.

DAY 5

1963

CALA SALADA- PTO ANDRAITX

The “Red Lightning” tram links the coastal town of Port de Sóller with the small hinterland town of Sóller. The latter settlement is located on the west coast of Majorca in the so-called “Valley of Gold”, which owes its name to the thousands of orange trees growing there and the local olive oil industry. Sóller is nestled in behind the mountain peaks of the Serra de Tramuntana, with its flanks of orange tree plantations and pine forest.

Board the delightful narrow gauge train in the Port of Soller and take the short journey to the town of Soller Itself. Charming and unspoilt, this small mountain town is dominated by a lovely 16th century church and is alive with opens squares, outdoor cafés and restaurants.



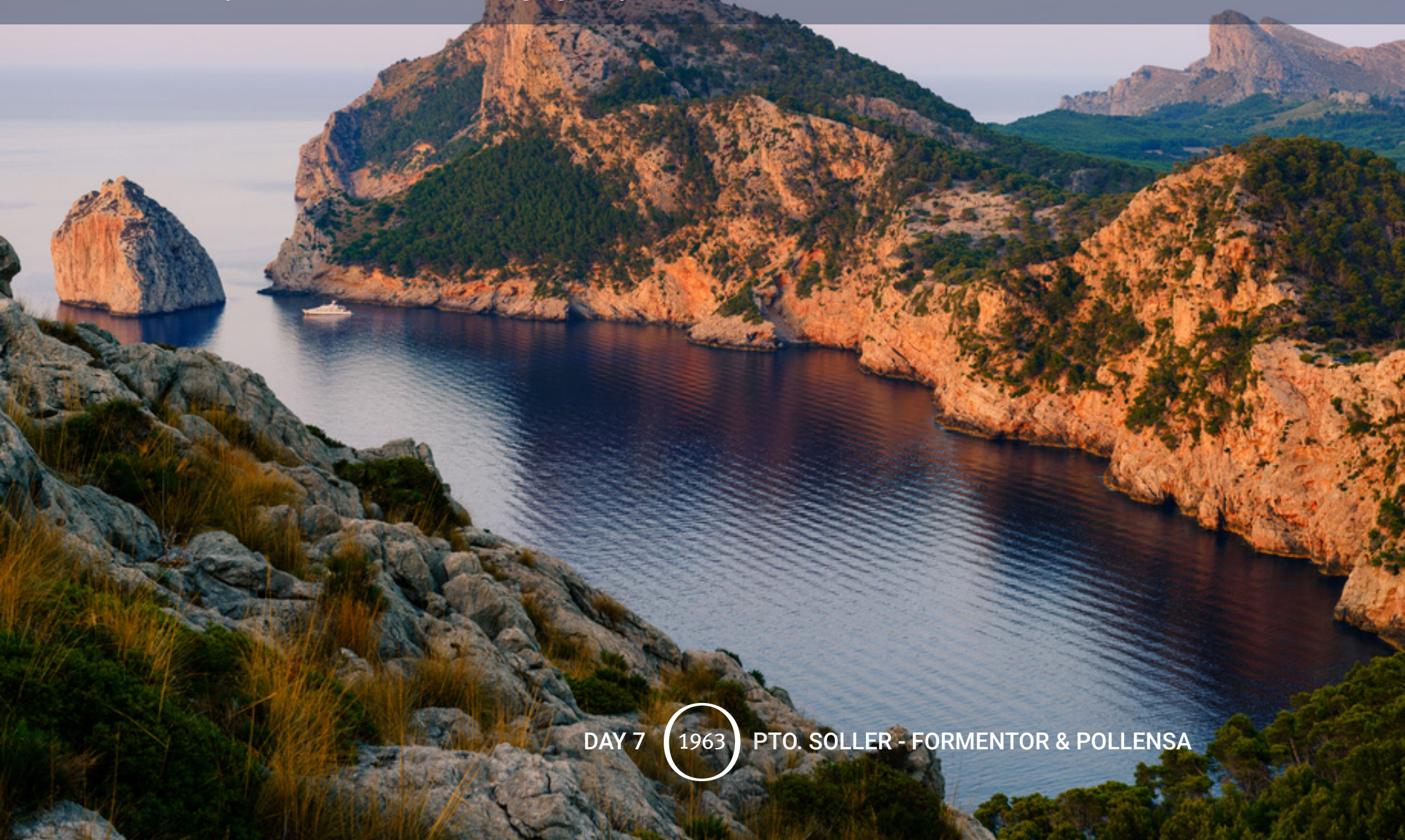
DAY 6

1963

PTO. ANDRAITX - PTO. SOLLER

Cap de Formentor, where the top end of the Serra de Tramuntana meets the Mediterranean. A windswept lighthouse stands on this promontory and, although it's not open to visitors, you can walk around its rocky surroundings, looking out to the cliffs where Eleonora's falcons nest in the winter. You can also spot seabirds in their thousands during migration periods.


On this leg, you'll round the legendary Cabo de Formentor, known as the Devil's Tail, and tuck into the harbor of Pollensa at the foot of the Tramuntana mountains. The calm bay is perfect for water toys. Dine at the classic Hotel Formentor, where Princess Grace and Prince Rainier honeymooned.



DAY 7

1963

PTO. SOLLER - FORMENTOR & POLLENSA



You'll have a chance to view the shoreline of Mallorca, consumed by its massive cathedral, on your return to Palma. Once in port, you'll have time to visit the Gothic cathedral known to locals as La Seu or wander the narrow cobblestone streets of this historic town for some last tapas and Spanish wine before flying home.

Cruise back down along the west coast of Mallorca for your final night in the bustling Port of Palma where you can explore the gothic and renaissance architecture before hitting the nightlife of Palma.
